#### For Hearts that are Hurting

In recent years, we have arranged a 'Bereavement Service' (usually on the second Sunday afternoon in December) for those who have lost loved ones and may feel that particularly keenly around Christmas time. Whilst this service has been attended in the main by those who have been relatively recently bereaved, others whose loss has been longer ago have also come.

Due to COVID restrictions, we felt unable to hold a Bereavement Service last year. This year we are pleased to hold a special service at 3pm on Sunday 12th December but would like to widen the scope of the service as being 'For Hearts that are Hurting'. It is very much our hope that this service will be of comfort to those who have been bereaved. However, we would also wish anyone whose heart may be hurting for some other reason to know that they too are most welcome to come.

The service itself will take place in the church building and is expected to last around half an hour. Tea and coffee will be served in the Halls afterwards.

#### Midweek Service

It has been great to see the Midweek Service restart this autumn at a new time of 10am on Wednesday mornings. The service lasts for about 35 minutes and we are able to sing, pray and learn from the Bible together. In recent weeks, we have been studying the beginning of the book of Acts. After the service, there is the opportunity for fellowship over tea and coffee for those who can stay.

One encouragement of the Midweek Service is that it has enabled some folks to worship together who have not been able to do so on a Sunday morning. Perhaps there are others reading this who aren't able to come on a Sunday but could be on a Wednesday? If so, you'd be very welcome!

The Wednesday morning service will be taking a break on 22nd and 29th December and will restart on 5th January.

#### **Small Group Bible Studies**

It has been encouraging to see four small groups meeting week by week to study 1 Corinthians and to enjoy fellowship together this autumn. Having got to around the halfway point in the letter, we're planning to take a break in December and January before restarting in February. Most groups are now meeting face to face, in a home or in the church halls. If you'd be interested in joining up with one of these groups, please speak with the Minister.

#### **Sunday Club and Bible Class**

We continue to appreciate having Sunday Club and Bible Class joining us as part of the regular Sunday morning service now that we are able to worship together in greater numbers. One of the themes both Sunday Club and Bible Class have been looking at recently has been 'Looking after God's Creation'. This has been helpful to think about while COP26 has been taking place in Glasgow.

The last day of Sunday Club and Bible Class for this year will be Sunday 12th December and both will restart on Sunday 9th January. We will be having All Age Services on the three Sundays in between these dates (19th & 26th December and 2nd January).

#### Live-streaming at St Columba's

Earlier this year, the Kirk Session and Congregational Board decided to introduce live-streaming of our Sunday morning services to YouTube. We're delighted that the installation of the equipment for this is now complete. This has been funded for the most part through a grant from the Scottish Government's 'Adapt and Thrive' Programme.

When live-streaming, services will be recorded by video camera and simultaneously transmitted live to YouTube. By clicking a link on St Columba's website (www.kirkintilloch.org.uk) or going direct to our YouTube channel (search for 'St Columba's Church Kirkintilloch'), a service can be viewed by anyone with internet access on a laptop or similar device or on an internet-enabled TV. It is our aim to start the regular live-streaming of services from St Columba's on Sunday 5th December 2021.

We continue to warmly encourage all who can to come to services in the church building in person to do so. Indeed, we are mindful of being instructed in the Bible not to give up the habit of meeting together (Hebrews 10:25). However, we do recognise that for a variety of reasons this is simply not possible for everyone. It is our hope that for those in that position, these live-streamed services may be of benefit and encouragement.

We hope too that live-streaming will also perform an important role in increasing the 'reach' of St Columba's. The apostle Paul writes in 1 Corinthians 9:22, "I have become all things to all people so that by all possible means I might save some". In that spirit, we are glad to introduce live-streaming here at St Columba's, as one of the "possible means" of our day, so that we might better play our part in making the Good News about Jesus more widely known.

#### **Practical Matters**

The Church of Scotland has issued guidelines for congregations who are livestreaming services. The purpose of these guidelines is to protect privacy in line with data protection regulations and to ensure that everyone is aware of the areas covered by the cameras.

In our church building there are two video cameras. One of these is mounted at the rear of the building, high up on the vestibule. The other is high up on the right wall. Anyone sitting in the two last rows of pews on either side or on the soft chairs along the rear wall will not be seen by the cameras.

Our stewards will be familiar with the coverage and will be able to discuss this with anyone.



#### **COVID Challenge.**

As we come to the end of a year which has presented challenges we never expected, I wonder when we look back on 2021 what we will all remember most?

Was it wearing masks whenever we left the house? Washing our hands a dozen times a day? Missing our Sunday morning service in church? Coming to terms with not being able to socialise with family and friends in the carefree way we once took for granted?

Yes we learned to compromise. Our minister spoke to us on Zoom and that helped. Family got in touch by phone and online. We wrote letters to friends. I re-read books I'd enjoyed years ago. My husband tackled the mammoth task of tidying out his garage while I cleared out cupboards and drawers still stuffed with clothes, games and toys belonging to the childhood of our three sons and one daughter who are now all parents themselves.

The daily News bulletins were full of grief and despondency as cunning Covid claimed the lives of thousands of men, women and children in Britain and around the world.

Where would it all end, we wondered? This pesky pandemic was stealing lives, hopes and dreams and the carefree childhood and adolescence of thousands of young people.

In laboratories around the world, scientists worked long hours searching for medical clues which would give us hope that a cure could be found to halt the spread of cruel Covid.

At the vaccination centre where John and I went for our jabs we met up again with neighbours and friends from our early years in Kirkintilloch. It was the first social gathering we'd had for weeks and all around the room the sound of voices talking, laughing and having fun was a blessed bonus.

Covid was being challenged by medical science and the human willingness to be vaccinated. How blessed are we as individuals and a country to have the opportunity to protect ourselves against this cruel disease?

So many people around the world have suffered dreadfully this year. So much still needs to be done to help those in the poorest countries who cannot cope.

God willing this Christmas we are able to give thanks that by sending His son Jesus as a helpless baby to be born in a stable in Bethlehem our Saviour who knows how frail and foolish we sometimes are, yet He gave us the greatest gift of love ever known.
