It has been a real joy in recent weeks to see so many of us able to come together to worship God in the church building on a Sunday morning. One of the indirect effects of the coronavirus pandemic has been how the various restrictions to our everyday lives have made us feel. I suspect that most of us have felt low or down at some point over the past 18 months as we have missed the company of others. Even now, as restrictions have eased, we may still feel discouraged or frustrated because life is not yet 'back to normal'.

Earlier today, I received a text from someone in the congregation to let me know they were praying for me. It made my day! It was such an encouragement!

It may be that you can encourage someone by sending a text, or a card, or a phone call, or just by asking how they're getting on over a coffee. In whatever way we can, let us encourage one another – and all the more as we look forward to the return of our Lord Jesus Christ.

"The Upper Room" is a booklet of biblical readings which can help us to focus our minds on setting aside a short time each day to read.

One woman who has found strength and comfort from doing just that is Christine Moore who told me how important the routine of reading daily from "The Upper 'Room" has become to her.

Christine was diagnosed with osteporosis over ten years ago and she works hard at keeping fit.

"I find that reading The Upper Room every day gives me strength and encouragement. As part of my daily routine my phsyical exercise includes lifting weights, walking and trying to stay active.

My Upper Room books are marked with notes that I can turn to when I need support. Some of the readings are from the Old Testament and some from the New Testament.

I read it in the morning and it is very helpful at keeping me positive."

Whilst at the time of writing the COVID situation in Scotland is in a delicate position we are grateful for these and other ways in which it is now easier for many of us to come together as a church family.

Given that we are now able to meet in the church building in significant numbers, and also given that we can sing together, we have decided that rather than continuing with putting a separate pre-recorded service online for 10:30am on a Sunday morning, we will put a recording of the actual service in the church building, online later in the day. We hope this will give those who are unable to attend the service in the church a greater sense of worshipping God alongside those of us in the building. Our aim is to have this available via the church website, www.kirkintillochstcolumbas.org.uk, and also on YouTube (search for St Columba's Church Kirkintilloch) for 7pm on the Sunday evening. However, you will understand that this may not always be possible if we encounter technical difficulties.

We are hugely grateful to all those who have worked tirelessly to make a separate pre-recorded service available for well over a year now – our IT/AV/Web Team, our Music Team, our Bible Reading Team, and a good number of others too. We greatly appreciate their ministry.

We're very grateful for whatever help you may be able to offer.


Church Flowers


