## From the Manse

By the time you read this, the Service of Union between St Columba's and Hillhead Churches will have taken place and we will be St Columba's Hillhead Church. I expect the Service of Union to take a little over an hour, but it will take longer than that for our two churches to truly come together as one. It is great that there are many friendships between folks at St Columba's and folks at Hillhead already. It is encouraging that we already worship and serve together, for example through the Guild. Still, it will take time for us to gel as one united church. We are a work in progress. We are a church under construction.

Some of us hope to walk or even cycle to Milton of Campsie after the Service of Union. I recently learned that the day after the union, resurfacing work is due to begin along the old railway line path. In recent years, the tree roots have protruded more and more through the tarmac making walking and cycling increasingly difficult.

However, there is now the prospect of a wonderful new path! In between times, there will be some disruption, but it will be worth it when the work is completed. Similarly, there will likely be bumps along the way as we come together as one church, but I hope and pray that the result will be worth it. These are days of considerable change in Glasgow Presbytery. Our goal in coming together as one church is that amidst that change, ministry and mission will thrive at both sites, St Columba's and Hillhead, and across the parish.

The Bible talks about the church as being a 'church under construction'. The apostle Peter says we are like *'living stones...being built into a spiritual house'* (1 Peter 2:5).

Similarly, as individuals, we are 'Christians under construction'. The apostle Paul talks about God beginning a 'good work' within us when we first come to know Jesus as our Lord and Saviour (Philippians 1:6). Whether as a church, or as individual Christians, we're works in progress!

Let's bear with one another then whilst we are 'Christians under construction'. Let's be patient as we're a 'Church under construction'. Let's not lose sight of that day when the 'work in progress' sign will be removed, and the finished product will be revealed.

#### Vision for a Children and Families Worker

In January 2022, we shared an exciting vision at St Columba's to build for the future by appointing a Children and Families Worker. This came about from a shared concern over the low number of children and families in our church and a longing to see this increase. Children are the seed corn of the church of the future, and we recognise the real and urgent need to attract more children and families into the fellowship. The broad remit of the Children and Families Worker post is to assist with ministry and mission to children and families. Specific areas of work would depend on the experience and skills of the successful candidate - as well as the opportunities to use these. Now that we have united as St Columba's Hillhead Church, the scope of the new post will encompass the new church and parish.

We recognised that financing a three-year appointment of a full-time Children and Families Worker is challenging but not impossible. It is likely to cost around £90,000 allowing for salary, necessary expenses including Income Tax and National Insurance, and costs for children's activities. A salary of £22,000-£24000 per annum is under consideration. We are pleased to report encouraging progress towards the cost of such a three-year appointment:

30% of the total (£27,000) has already been committed from existing church funds.

35% of the total (£31,500) has now been given or pledged specifically for this project following an extremely generous response from church members and regular attenders.

## Vision for a Children and Families Worker (cont'd)

There remains then 35% of the total (£31,500) to fundraise. We hope applications to grant awarding trusts will play a significant part in helping us reach that figure. At the time of writing, we have submitted three grant applications. A further two are in the pipeline and more will follow. One grant application, we have already heard, has been unsuccessful, but that is the nature of applying for grants. We are not expecting every application to be successful.

Thank you so much to everyone who is supporting this exciting and important venture in prayer or financially. We hope you are encouraged by this update, and we will keep you informed of further progress.

If you would like to give to the Children and Families Worker appeal, donations are still welcome and may be made as a monthly standing order or as one or more lump sums given specifically to this project. Please contact Neil Bathie, Treasurer at St Columba's, if you would like to know how to set that up.

## The Queen.

On the 6th of February 1952 I woke up in my little bed in the alcove of the room I shared with my mum and dad in our house in Coatbridge to the sound of crying.

I'd never heard my mum cry.

'What's wrong mummy?" I said as she cuddled me close.

"The King has died Margaret and we have a new Queen." "Who is she?" I asked.

"She will be called Queen Elizabeth" my mum replied. For the rest of that day the radio was on giving out the information

The next morning when our newspaper called The Bulletin, which my mum and dad read, arrived I saw photographs of this new Queen Elizabeth whose father King George the Sixth had died.

From that moment the story captivated my imagination. My parents didn't have a television but my grandparents did and so on Coronation Day, 2nd June 1953, my aunts and uncles, grandchildren and cousins gathered round the very small screened television in their home called 'Croftbank' in Coatbridge to watch the most amazing event I had ever seen - a Princess in a dazzling white gown having a heavy golden crown studded with jewels placed upon her head.

She made her vows in a firm voice with only a few tremors and later as the bells of the cathedral rang out she walked slowly back down the aisle Queen Elizabeth the Second.

From then on, exciting things happened. School children were given a Coronation mug, which I still have sitting on my dresser.

On her tour of the country the new Queen Elizabeth came to Coatbridge and all the schoolchildren lined the Main Street on both sides as she waved from an open topped car.

## The Queen (cont'd)

My friend Jean and I played Coronations regularly. It was our favourite game.

When I grew up and decided I wanted to be a journalist, my mother was a bit disappointed. She'd hoped I'd be a schoolteacher. But gradually when she realised that I loved my work - interviewing people from all walks of life and telling their stories, she could see it was exactly what I'd always wanted.

When she died I found she'd kept copies of articles containing my interviews with Margaret Thatcher in Downing Street to the ordination of Cardinal Winning - wrapped carefully in a drawer in her bureau.

On the night he became Cardinal, in Rome, he entertained the Scottish press and he said to me "Well what does a wee Protestant from Coatbridge make of this Maggie?"

I smiled at his teasing comments and said "Well Cardinal it goes a long way to explaining the Reformation"

Thankfully he laughed.

In my working life I was fortunate to meet people from varied backgrounds facing many challenges. It was a privilege to listen and learn how they coped.

Now as the Queen continues to fulfill the promises she made as a young woman, I think that all of us, whether Royalist or not, owe her a debt of gratitude for a life of service to our country. God Bless the Queen.

#### PRISON FELLOWSHIP SCOTLAND (PFS): LETTER WRITING PROGRAMME (LWP)

PFS is a non-denominational Christian organisation reaching out to prisoners in almost all of Scotland's 15 jails. Most of the voluntary work has consisted of trained volunteers visiting groups of inmates to share the Gospel with them and to show them Christian love, concern and encouragement.

This outreach has in the past two years been augmented by a pilot project of trained letter writers. They commit to writing to individual prisoners who have been identified by the prison Chaplaincy Team as being likely to benefit from Christian contact in this way. A similar letter-writing programme has operated in England for more than 20 years with considerable success. PFS feels it is now ready to expand its LWP to include a larger number of Scottish jails and is seeking the support of committed Christian men and women to become involved in this exciting and rewarding service. 50% of Scottish prisoners over the age of 60 yrs receive not a single visit from one year to the next. Consequently, a kindly constructed letter on a fairly regular basis can make a big difference. That is not to say that we are naive about crime and its consequences.
