# From the Manse

Have you ever had the experience of meeting an old friend, someone you've not seen for months or even years, and to your delight finding them just the same as they always were? They may have aged a little on the outside. They may have a little less hair. There may be a touch more grey about it. They may even be a bit slower in moving around. But it is so reassuring to find that inside they haven't changed a bit.

We live in a world of such change: two years of a global pandemic have brought about changes we could scarcely have imagined beforehand; COP26 was a wake-up call to many of us about our changing climate and what we need to do about it; and right now, we are witnessing truly horrifying scenes from Ukraine of a brutal dictator seeking to change the political map of Europe with no regard for the terrible human cost. Besides all of this, some of us have experienced the most profound change at a very personal level in recent days as we have mourned the loss of those so dear to us.

In the face of such change, how reassuring it is to know that God has not changed a bit. What's more, unlike even the best of human friends, He does not age. He is eternal. As we read in Psalm 146:6,

#### *"He is the Maker of heaven and earth, The sea, and everything in them – He remains faithful for ever."*

It is good to remind ourselves often, and especially in this world of change, that our God is unchanging. When once he has set his heart in love upon us, he will be forever faithful. No one can snatch us from His hand.

On Monday 27th December 2021, one of our long-standing members, Christine Grant, died. In recent years, Christine hadn't kept in good health, but her passing came as a shock to many of us.

Christine was an elder here at St Columba's. It was especially apparent during COVID lockdowns that she was very attentive to the church members in her 'district'. Her frequent phone calls were much appreciated, as was her practical support for those in her care.

Christine was a former Leprosy Mission Representative here at St Columba's. Christine's husband Dougie was touched that donations amounting to £350 given at Christine's funeral have furthered the work of Leprosy Mission in Christine's memory.

Remarkably, Christine managed to combine her support of Leprosy Mission with a life-long love of dancing, arranging line dancing events here at St Columba's in aid of Leprosy Mission. Christine's love of dancing was something first inspired by her mother Netta, a dancing teacher. It was at the dancing that Christine first met Dougie.

In years gone by, Christine helped lead Sunday School at St Columba's. She was also a committed Guide leader. She very much enjoyed being a member of the badminton club as well.

One of the common threads through all Christine's varied interests and activities was that she was always thinking of others. Another thread, linked to that, was her faith. It was very apparent to those looking on that Christine put her faith into practice in the ordinary things of life.

We thank God for Christine and every memory of her. We continue to pray that Christine's husband Dougie and her children, Tony & Jackie, might know God's comfort in these days.

# **Stepping Stones from Creation to the Cross**

During Lent 2022, a group of a dozen or more Church of Scotland ministers from across the country are teaming up to produce a series of short Lent Meditations. HELP REQUIRED! (Request for Volunteer Gardeners)

# Proposal of Union between St Columba's and Hillhead Churches

Members at St Columba's will be aware that before Christmas we announced a proposal of union between St Columba's Church and our near neighbour, Hillhead Church. That proposal came with the backing of both Kirk Sessions, and of Rev Bill Finnie at Hillhead Church, and of Rev Philip Wright at St Columba's Church. We felt it gave the best opportunity for ministry and mission to thrive, both at St Columba's and at Hillhead, even as the denomination seeks to address significant challenges including financial ones.

We set out more of the reasoning behind that proposal, and how it might work out in practice, in a letter to members of both churches around the beginning of December last year. We also held two open meetings here at St Columba's in mid-December and more recently two 'drop-in' opportunities to discuss the proposal further.

Our sense from what we have heard is that there is indeed support for a union from both congregations. On Tuesday 8th February, the two Kirk Sessions approved unanimously, at two separate meetings, a short document known as a 'Basis of Union' between the two churches. On Sunday 27th March 2022, after the Sunday morning services both at St Columba's and Hillhead, there will be an opportunity for church members to vote on the proposal. Our expectation is that, should both congregations approve the union, it would be likely to come before the May meeting of Glasgow Presbytery.

I do hope you will feel able to support the proposed union. Should the union proceed, one of the most obvious changes people are likely to notice here at St Columba's will be the Sunday morning service start time moving forward by half an hour to 10:00am.

# Proposal of Union between St Columba's and Hillhead Churches (cont 'd)

We hope you will understand the reason for this is to enable an 11:30am Sunday service to take place at Hillhead. Our hope at this point is for around half of the Sunday services at Hillhead to be led or attended by myself with the other half being led by a small team of visiting ministers and readers. We would review this arrangement after a period of 12 months.

Our vision in proposing this union is not simply to find a way of continuing Sunday morning services in both locations. Indeed, it may be that after review we change the time of the Sunday service at Hillhead or consider a different style of service altogether. Our wider vision is that together as one church we might grow in discipleship of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, and that we might harness the resources of both congregations to spread the Good News about Jesus and where God in His providence has placed us, here in East Kirkintilloch. With that in mind, it is encouraging to hear news in this edition of the magazine of plans to start a Carer and Toddler Group at Hillhead in the coming weeks.

I am glad that we are also able to include in this edition of the magazine an article from Stuart MacGill, Convener of the Strategic Planning Committee of Glasgow Presbytery. This article discusses amongst other things some of the practical arrangements for voting on Sunday 27th March. There is also a copy, in this magazine, of the 'Basis of Union' to which Stuart refers in that article and about which members will be asked to vote. Please do arrange to speak with me if you have any outstanding questions or comments about what we are proposing or indeed any questions about the voting process.

We continue to look to our faithful God to lead and guide us in these days.

# Proposed Union of St Columba's and Hillhead Churches

#### **Guide to Voting Procedure**

The following is an article from Stuart MacGill, Convener of the Strategic Planning Committee of Glasgow Presbytery. We are grateful to Stuart for setting out the congregational voting procedure for the proposed union between St Columba's and Hillhead churches. Please note that since Stuart wrote this article the date of the congregational votes, both at St Columba's and Hillhead, has been confirmed as being Sunday 27th March. Reference is also made below to a document called a 'Basis of Union' between St Columba's and Hillhead churches. A copy of the Basis of Union is also included in this magazine.

#### Background

To understand the reasoning behind the proposed voting process, it is necessary to appreciate the principles of a "Charge" as interpreted in Church of Scotland Law. Under the Church of Scotland system, a Minister is called to a Charge – normally comprising a single congregation. Therefore, at present there are two separate Charges involved in the current procedure - St Columba's and Hillhead. Whenever there are changes made to a Charge, it ceases to exist (as does its ministry) and a new call has to be put in place to appoint a Minister to the new Charge. In this case, the new Charge will be the United Congregation. This has been endorsed by both Kirk Sessions. Whilst St Columba's has a Minister with full tenure, Hillhead is currently under Guardianship (i.e., with no post allocated to it in the old Presbytery Plan); when the Union takes place, Hillhead's Guardianship will be ended and the new ministry to the United Charge will remain unrestricted.

# Voting Procedure

Voting procedure is governed by General Assembly legislation which provides for voting by secret ballot. This can be done at a congregational meeting, typically held after worship on a nominated Sunday which will be announced from the pulpit for two weeks prior to the agreed date.

The Basis of Union will be circulated prior to the meeting to give members the opportunity to read the terms. At the meeting only full members are permitted to vote though others may attend. Members of Presbytery will attend and count the votes, announcing the result afterwards.

In order to comply with the legislation, members of Hillhead require to be separately asked to vote on two separate questions dealing with the following issues:

1. Whether the terms of the attached Basis of Union, (apart from clause 7 which specifically states that the Rev Philip Wright be the Minister of the proposed United Charge) should be approved.

2. Whether, in terms of the aforesaid clause 7 the Rev Philip Wright be the Minister of the United Charge.

The members of St Columba's only require to vote once on the entire Basis of Union as a separate decision on the minister is not necessary.

The precise of wording for each of the questions will be clearly set out in the ballot paper. Voting will be by placing an "X" in a YES/NO box. A simple majority vote is required for all questions by both congregations in order to proceed with the proposed Union. Should any single question not attract a majority vote, Presbytery's Strategic Planning Committee would normally require to review the situation and enter into fresh discussions with the Kirk Sessions of both congregations but given the timescale for preparing the new Presbytery Mission Plan, this process would have to be abandoned and the future of both congregations would be determined under the new Planning process.

# Voting Procedure (cont'd)

If everything is approved at congregational level, these decisions are taken by the Strategic Planning Committee to Presbytery for its approval, at which point the date for the Union may be adjusted (to suit all parties involved in the formal service). There is normally a need for the Faith Nurture Committee of the Central Church to agree ('concur") with the proposal but since the existing Presbytery Plan has been suspended and a new Presbytery Mission Plan is in the process of formulation we are currently operating with no Plan against which this Union can be considered and so the decision of Presbytery can simply be "noted" centrally. It is Presbytery policy to consult with the appropriate sub-committee of Faith Nurture in advance and that has been done with no adverse comments having been received.

Thereafter, the service of Union and the official induction of Philip Wright as Minister of the United Charge can proceed.

The Basis of Union states that the United Congregation will be administered under the Unitary Constitution.

St Columba's does not currently use this but a positive vote for the Basis also covers a change to the Unitary Constitution and this does not require a separate vote.

Both congregations should be aware that the implementation of the terms of this Basis of Union does not imply that there will be no further changes contained within the new Presbytery Mission Plan for the United Charge, in terms of both ministry and buildings.

# **Basis of Union**

The congregation of St Columba Parish Church of Scotland, Kirkintilloch (SC008735) ("Kirkintilloch: St Columba's") and the congregation of Kirkintilloch Hillhead Church of Scotland (SC002424) ("Kirkintilloch: Hillhead") shall be united on 1 June 2022, or from a date to be determined by Presbytery, and that on the following terms and conditions:

1. **Name:** The name of the united congregation shall be Kirkintilloch St Columba's Hillhead Church of Scotland and SC008735 will be retained.

2. **Transference of Property and Funds:** The property and funds belonging to or held on behalf of each congregation shall belong to or be held on behalf of the united congregation and any transference necessary shall be duly effected.

3. **Places of Worship:** Both churches at present used and occupied by the congregations of Kirkintilloch: St Columba's and Kirkintilloch: Hillhead shall be the places of worship of the united congregation. Services shall be conducted in Kirkintilloch: St Columba's and in Kirkintilloch: Hillhead each Sunday and at such other times as may be determined, all to be decided by the Minister and Kirk Session subject to the approval of Presbytery.

4. **Territorial Responsibility:** The bounds to be served by the united charge shall be designated as the bounds of the parishes of Kirkintilloch: St Columba's and Kirkintilloch: Hillhead, or as the Presbytery shall determine.

5. **Kirk Session:** The elders of both Kirk Sessions shall form with the minister or ministers the Kirk Session of the united congregation.

# Basis of Union (cont'd)

6. **Congregational Management:** The temporal affairs of the united congregation shall be administered by the Kirk Session in terms of the Unitary Constitution, the Delegation of Assembly being authorised to issue the appropriate Deed of Constitution to the said congregation.

7. **Minister:** The Rev Dr Philip Wright, currently minister at Kirkintilloch: St Columba's, shall be the minister of the united charge in terms of Section 8 of Act VIII 2021.

8. **Manse:** The manse of the congregation of Kirkintilloch: St Columba's shall be the manse of the united congregation. The manse of the congregation of Kirkintilloch: Hillhead shall be sold, let or otherwise disposed of, subject to the titles on which it is held, and subject to the approval of the Presbytery and, if necessary, of the General Trustees or the General Assembly. The free proceeds of any such sale or let shall: (a) if falling within the scope of Act VII 1995, be credited to the benefit of the congregation in the Consolidated Fabric Fund; or (b) if not falling within the scope of the said Act, be held and applied for fabric purposes in connection with the properties of the congregation.

9. **Ministerial Support:** The stipend of the charge shall be paid in accordance with the terms of the National Stipend Scheme.

10. **Power to Readjust:** While the articles and terms shall form the Basis of Union for the two congregations now uniting, the united congregation shall be free, like other congregations, to adjust arrangements under the authority of Presbytery as need may arise.

# Vision for a Children and Families Worker

At the Sunday services on 30 January and 6 February and the Midweek Service on 26 January, we were glad to share an exciting vision to build for the future here at St Columba's by appointing a Children and Families Worker. We invited those present to take away an information sheet and to consider supporting this venture both in prayer and financially. It has been encouraging to see people responding to that invitation and expressing enthusiasm for this venture.

For the benefit of those who may not have been able to access the information sheet we thought it would be helpful to print a slightly abbreviated version of it as follows in this edition of the magazine for your prayerful consideration.

#### Vision

Belonging to the church here at St Columba's means a great deal to many of us and we are grateful to God for the fellowship we share with one another. However, we may also be concerned that the number of children and families in our church is low. We long to see this increase. Children are the seed corn of the church of the future, and we recognise the real and urgent need to attract more children and families into the fellowship.

With this in mind, the Kirk Session asked a small team of elders (Anne Inglis, Jackie Ringan and Ramsay Vallance), along with the minister, to explore the possibility of employing a Children and Families Worker here at St Columba's. After prayerful consideration and seeking expert advice, this small team recommended to Session that appointing a full-time Children and Families Worker, over a period of three years in the first instance and with a view to starting in Autumn 2022, could greatly benefit our church fellowship and indeed our wider community including local schools. Session was pleased to accept this recommendation.

# Vision for a Children and Families Worker (cont'd)

# Remit

The broad remit of a Children and Families Worker would be to assist with ministry and mission to children and families. Specific areas of work would depend on the experience and skills of the successful candidate – as well as the opportunities to use these. However, we would expect the areas of work to include some of the following: Leadership of children's ministry on a Sunday morning; Developing relationships with children and families made through some of the existing midweek activities of the church; Identifying and grasping opportunities within the local community for mission to children and families; Making use of holiday periods to organise activities for children and families; Assisting with school chaplaincy work.

# Funding

Financing a three-year appointment of a full-time Children and Families Worker is challenging but not impossible. It is likely to cost around £90,000 allowing for salary and necessary expenses including Income Tax and National Insurance. A salary of £22,000-£24000 per annum is under consideration.

We believe that funding this project could be achieved from three sources:

- 30% of the total (£27,000) from existing church funds. The Kirk Session has recommended this to the Congregational Board and the Congregational Board has accepted this recommendation.
- 2) 35% of the total (£31,500) from specific giving for this project from individual church members/regular attenders.

# Vision for a Children and Families Worker (cont'd)

 35% of the total (£31,500) from one or more successful grant applications. We believe that grant applications are more likely to be successful if a significant part of the funding has already been raised.

# Support

In the first place, please do pray for the outworking of this vision for a Children and Families worker here at St Columba's, that God would be pleased to bless this appointment for the good of his church and indeed the wider community.

Secondly, we would be most grateful if you would give prayerful consideration to supporting the project financially. We firmly believe that this project could represent a huge investment in the future of the church. Donations may be made as a monthly standing order or as one or more lump sums given specifically to this project. If you wish to give by standing order, please contact Neil Bathie, the church treasurer, who will be pleased to give you a form to complete and either return to him or put it in a marked envelope in the offering plate on a Sunday morning. We would then forward the completed standing order form to the appropriate bank. Alternatively, if you wish to give a lump sum donation, please hand this to the church office (between 10 and 12, Mon and Thurs) or put it in the offering plate on a Sunday morning.

Whilst we would be hugely grateful for financial support for the project at any time, any gifts given or pledged before we submit grant applications (from the end of March 2022) would be especially helpful as the more we can say we have raised locally by that point, the greater the likelihood of these grant applications being successful.
