From the Manse

We've been looking at the Apostle Paul's letter to the Romans for quite a few weeks now on Sunday mornings at St Columba's Hillhead. It is a wonderful 'Course on Christianity'. Paul sets out how we become a Christian, how we are to live as Christians, and what our destiny is as Christian people. He tells us of God's many blessings to us, and most of all the gift of his Son, Jesus Christ. I am finding going through the book of Romans so helpful for my own faith in Christ. I hope you are too.

It is perhaps hard to imagine, when Paul is in full flow proclaiming the Gospel, that he was not always like this. There was a time when he was a great persecutor of the early church. But God, in his grace, led Paul to Himself on the Road to Damascus. As Paul put his faith in Christ, he became a new man.

When Paul arrived in Jerusalem, the question in so many of the Believers' minds was – can Paul the Persecutor really be a Christian now? It is at this point that a man called Barnabas (which means 'Son of Encouragement') took Paul to the other Apostles, and reassured them that Paul's faith in Christ was the real deal. Paul had 'seen the Lord' and 'preached fearlessly in the name of Jesus' (Acts 9:27). Barnabas's encouragement that Paul was indeed a genuine Believer, and an Apostle of Christ, was hugely significant in Paul then being welcomed as a fellow-Apostle.

What a difference an encouraging word can make! Barnabas was an encouragement by name and an encouragement by nature. He went on to accompany Paul in the early part of his ministry.

We all have different gifts to use for the benefit of the church. Some of these are more prominent than others. All are important. The gift of encouragement can be such a blessing to others. A word of encouragement can affirm someone in their service. It can help them see that what they do is worthwhile.

It can even motivate them to carry on. Some people are especially good at encouraging others. But we must all encourage one another in the family of God (1 Thessalonians 5:11).

Take time to look around the church and see the many ways that people serve the Lord and one another. Take time to say, 'thank you' and to affirm others in their service. Let's encourage one another to grow in our faith in Christ, perhaps as we talk about something mentioned in the sermon over tea and coffee after the service is over. Let's go out of our way to encourage those who are going through difficult times.

And here's a final thought. Another way we can encourage one another is by focussing on the worship of God and the fellowship of His people on a Sunday. It is a day of rest.

We look forward to the next visit to his brother in law.

Once again, grateful thanks to everyone who has donated all the money to this very worthwhile cause and for the continued support with the ongoing collection of loose coin.

Christian Aid Report Spring 2024

Christian Aid Week this year will take place from Sunday, 12th to Saturday, 18th May 2024. Donation envelopes will be available on Sunday 5th May and can be returned to the Church on the following Sundays.

The annual Christian Aid Service for all the local churches will take place in Hillhead Church Halls during April and the date will be advertised in the Sunday sheets once it has been confirmed.

The appeal for donations for humanitarian aid for the people of Gaza is still ongoing and details can be found on the Christian Aid website.

Other items on the website include an update of the support being offered to the people of Southern Turkey and North West Syria in the aftermath of the two major earthquakes which caused so much devastation in February 2023.

There is also an item which details the problems being faced because of climate change by the flower growers in Kenya, Columbia and The Netherlands. Many of the flowers, particularly roses, that we purchase in our supermarkets are grown in Kenya and severe drought followed by sudden heavy rainfall has caused many plants to die severely affecting the livelihoods of the growers.

Many poor communities throughout the world depend on the work of charities like Christian Aid to provide relief and fund projects which help them to feed themselves and educate their children.

MAF (Mission Aviation Fellowship)

MAF – Oldest Pilot in a Spitfire

On Monday 5 February, 102-year old MAF co-founder and RAF veteran Jack Hemmings became the oldest British pilot to fly a Spitfire. It was a poignant moment to celebrate Jack's passion for aviation and dedication to MAF — the organisation he helped establish — on the 80th anniversary year of D-Day.

Flying multi-engine bomber aircraft including the Lockheed Hudson during World War II, it was Jack's first time inside a Spitfire — an experience he described as 'absolutely delightful'. Preparing for take-off at London Biggin Hill's Heritage Hangar with an audience of major news outlets, RAF dignitaries and MAF friends, Jack said he 'felt very pleased indeed' to be going up in Britain's best-loved World War II aircraft.

Jack used the history-making flight to honour his best man, RAF Engineer Stuart King, who was involved in the D-Day landings with 247 Fighter Squadron. Although Stuart passed away in 2020, Jack said, 'Stuart — you would have loved it!' Jack and Stuart helped found MAF UK back in 1948, using a Miles Gemini aircraft, to perform the first British humanitarian survey of central Africa, which lasted ten months.

Now the oldest Spitfire pilot is hoping to continue raising awareness and funds for MAF, having set up a JustGiving page to celebrate his laterlife achievement. Back on the ground after enjoying three victory rolls, Jack admitted it was faster than he used to fly in the RAF, but was nonetheless 'thoroughly enjoyable'.

Cassie Carlsen came to Scotland to be a missionary with a refugee church in Glasgow and primarily focused on teaching English. She came for three months initially and loved it here in Glasgow. She enjoyed her time so much that she decided she wanted to stay for longer and continue on in missions work.

She told me, "Quite simply I fell in love with Scotland. I loved the people in Glasgow and loved the church I volunteered with. I came back to Scotland in order to study and continue to teach English. I completed a Graduate Degree in Speech, Language and Sociolinguistics this past year at the University of Glasgow." In America, Cassie worked organising weddings and also as a Behavioural Therapist for children with additional needs.

"I finished my master's and felt my time in Scotland was not completed. I wanted to continue in ministry here in Scotland. It was a privilege to be hired by St. Columba's Hillhead where I am able to continue in ministry. I have a heart for children, and I feel that this is a wonderful fit for me."

"My Faith is vital to me. I grew up going to church and always believed that my Faith was important to my life. At one point I had to go through a very hard, life-changing circumstance and it really tested my faith but ultimately it led me to a place where my faith became my own, not just the faith of my mother."

"I think Scotland is 'awesome' and even if the climate is sometimes challenging, Scottish people are so friendly. I have made many friends here and Scotland has become a home for me. As long as God wants me to be here, I will happily be here."
